We also offer a good variety of Accesible Shore Excursion worldwide (according to the ports availability and local structure) that are designed for guests unable to negotiate motor coach steps or for full time wheelchair/scooter users. The vehicle used on this type of shore excursion is adapted with an access ramp (or lift where available) to accommodate a limited number of mobility devices. In order to use the ramp and/or lift, guests are required to be seated on a wheelchair or scooter. For your safety and enjoyment and that of your fellow guests, please be certain to select excursions that meet your physical capability. SILVERSEA SHUTTLE SERVICE

Complimentary transportation may be provided by Silversea when the local town is beyond a reasonable walking distance from the port. This service may not be possible in ports where a strong taxi union exists, preventing Silversea from providing a complimentary shuttle. The availability and schedule for this service will be announced onboard and listed in the Silversea Chronicles. We are not able to advise this in advance. Operationally, intervals between shuttle bus departures could be affected by local traffic. Silversea is not liable for any unforeseen delays. There will be a break in service for driver meal times. Shuttle service is offered during the day only. The shuttle service is designed to augment local transportation; guests requiring more flexibility may prefer not to wait for a shuttle and secure a taxi at their own expense.

CHILDREN ON TOUR

To ensure the safety of our younger guests, participation by children in certain shore excursions may be restricted. Children up to the age of 8 years old are only permitted to participate in suitable Silver Shore Excursions and the shuttle service if the vehicles are equipped with the correct safety harness and seating equipment. Such harnesses' and secure

seating cannot be guaranteed. Alternately, guests may use their own approved safety seat, booster seat or harness as long as they are compatible with the local touring vehicle and can properly secure the young guest. Silversea reserves the right to refuse children under the age of 8 years old on any tour on the basis of safety.

KTN-002 / Saxman Native Village & City Tour

Difficulty



Price: \$79 - Duration: 2.50 hr(s)

Enjoy a rare window into Native culture as you visit Saxman Village, an active Native Village near the historic city of Ketchikan. Be sure to bring your camera, as this 2.5-hour tour provides uncommon access to the cultural elements that make up the rich living culture of Alaskan Native Americans. Begin and end your visit with a scenic drive and a driving tour of Ketchikan.

Scenic Drive to Saxman Village and Village Welcome

Begin with a lovely, narraded drive through Ketchikan before arriving at Saxman Native Village. Upon arrival, experience a traditional tribal welcome ceremony, following the ways of the Tlingits in welcoming visitors for centuries and set out on a walk along a short nature trail.

Cultural Experience at Saxman Village: Native Dancing, Totem Park, Carving Shed Demonstration

As you enter the Beaver Clan House, find a seat and prepare yourself for an elaborate display of traditional songs and dances performed by the Cape Fox Dancers. Through banging drums, infused aromas, lighting, native props, and regalia the songs will portray the stories about the fierce warrior men and women of the village. There is also the chance for participation, as you are given Tlingit costume to try on for you to join the Cape Fox Dancers during the final portion of the show.

Walk to the Saxman Totem Park to get educated on the history of the impressive totem poles that play an important role in Native Alaskan culture. Your knowledgeable Tour Host shares with you the history and significance of awe-inspiring, enormous master-works that tower over you.

Then at the Village Carving Center watch carvers busily at work, with energetic and eager apprentices nearby interested in carrying on the tradition of making Native art - some of the most sought-after Native pieces in the world. There is an opportunity to bring some of this beautiful work home at the Village Store to help seal your unforgettable experience at Saxman Native Village.

Ketchikan Scenic Driving Tour

After your visit to the village, it is time to re-board the coach. Take a brief ride through and around charming Ketchikan as you wind your way back to the ship. Highlights include driving past Alaska's busiest waterfront, home to not just boats but also water-planes, as well as the notorious Creek Street, formerly the city's red-light district during the Gold Rush, and of course the historic residential areas and the turn-of-the-century style downtown area. Return to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking, approximately half a mile, with 500 feet of incline to negotiate and some gravel paths. Stairs can be bypassed, making this tour suitable for guests in a wheelchair, though an ADA-accessible vehicle must be requested in advance. There is no minimum age to participate, but vehicles do not have a child safety seat. Guests are recommended dress in warm layers and wear comfortable walking shoes, and to bring binoculars and bottled water. Space on this tour is somewhat limited; we suggest you book well in advance to avoid disappointment.

KTN-007 / Bonfire Bay Oyster Farm

Experience the coastal splendour, marine life and flavours of coastal Ketchikan during this half-day sightseeing excursion. Ketchikan, Coastal Drive, Bonfire Bay, Boat-Cruise, Clover Passage

Depart the pier for an approximately 30-minute drive along the coast to Bonfire Bay, where local guides bring Ketchikan's past-and-present to life. Upon arrival, embark a 20-passenger USCG-approved vessel for a short cruise across the Clover Passage to the Hump Island Oyster Farm, the only working oyster and kelp farm in the state.

Hump Island Oyster Farm, Guided Tour, Interactive Touch-Tank Experience

Upon arrival at the Hump Island Oyster Farm, a one-of-a-kind floating facility, the crew provides a behind-the-scenes overview of the kelp-and-oyster-growing process. In addition, view local sea life via an interactive, touch-tank experience and enjoy great photo opportunities, you can even browse the gift shop for unique souvenirs.

Oyster Bar, Tasting of Locally-Harvested Oyster and Kelp Products, Gift Shop

Next, proceed to the onsite Oyster Bar for an amazing, sea-to-table tasting experience. Here, tantalise your taste buds with a sampling of locally-harvested oyster and kelp products. Group sizes are intimate, so there is plenty of time to engage with your knowledgeable local guides. At the conclusion of your visit, embark your vessel for the short cruise back to Bonfire Bay. Upon arrival, disembark the vessel, re-board your coach and commence the approximately 45-minute drive back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking, at times over uneven and slippery surfaces, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach and embark/disembark the boat, several steps to navigate a tidal-dependent ramp and 13 steps at the entrance to the Oyster Bar. This tour is not suitable for guests prone to seasickness, guests with limited mobility and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Guests are advised to wear warm, comfortable clothing in layers with flat, closed-toe walking shoes, and bring sun protection, a weatherproof jacket. Guests must be at least six years old to participate on this tour. Guests must be at least 18 years old to participate in tastings of alcoholic beverages. Due to the size of the lifejackets, guests must weigh at least 40 pounds (about 18 kilograms) to participate on this tour. The tour sequence may vary. Space on this tour is extremely limited; we suggest you book well in advance to avoid disappointment.

After the show, venture to Saxman Native Village to immerse yourself in the captivating Tlingit culture. Explore an impressive collection of artifacts that reveal the rich indigenous heritage of Southeast Alaska. Marvel at the intricately carved canoes that once navigated the region's waters and appreciate the majestic totem poles, each one telling stories of family lineage, significant historical events, and ancient myths. You'll also discover traditional regalia worn during dances and cultural celebrations, treasured and preserved through generations.

Lastly, indulge in a unique Alaskan culinary experience that features locally crafted delicacies. Savor the artistry behind flavors that highlight the region's bounty, from bull kelp salsas and hot sauces to artisanal blueberry soda and s'more stout. Each delightful dish will be perfectly paired with a carefully curated beverage flight of your choice, enhancing your culinary adventure.

KTN-014 / UTV Land and Sea Safari

Embrace the breath-taking natural beauty of the George Inlet Fjords via land and sea during this exhilarating, half-day UTV and sightseeing vessel excursion with lunch.

Ketchikan, Narrated Drive, Guided UTV-Ride

Depart the pier for the approximately 45-minute drive to the UTV Base Camp, and your awaiting Utility Terrain Vehicle (UTV). En route, learn about the rich history of logging days in Ketchikan whilst passing by the small-town scenery and historic local landmarks that include the Ward Cove Pulp Mill. Upon arrival at the White River Base Camp, meet the UTV leader, and receive your safety and riding instructions and gear. Afterward, hop behind the wheel of your UTV, get comfortable with your seatbelts on and camera ready, and prepare to get muddy on your guided UTV adventure. The ride to-and-from the Mahoney Glacial Cirque is over five miles (about eight kilometres) in each direction.

Mountain Trails, Mahoney Glacial Cirque, Waterfalls, Lakes, Streams,

Follow your UTV leader in single-file formation, and explore the mountain trails of the George Inlet Fjords. Your guided, adrenaline-filled route drives up old logging roads, across jaw-dropping bridges that cross over several rivers, and leads to the scenery of the Mahoney Glacial Cirque with its magnificent waterfalls, lakes, and streams. This remote setting is ideal for adventure-seekers, and those wishing to go off the beaten path. Be sure to capture as many photos as possible, and take turns driving. Your UTV-ride concludes back at the UTV Base Camp.

Sightseeing Cruise, Old Gold Mine, George Inlet Cannery & Lodge, Beer-Tasting, Crab Lunch

Next, embark an enclosed, approximately 46-foot (about 14-metre) Sightseeing vessel for a scenic, approximately seven-mile (about 11-kilometre) ride along the coast. View the Mahoney Glacial Cirque from far below the trails you were just driving on, be sure to photograph the old gold mine and historic George Inlet Cannery. Upon arrival at the George Inlet Lodge, enjoy its rustic charm and hospitality during a tasting of five craft beers from two local breweries paired with crab chowder, smoked salmon dip, steaming hot Dungeness crab, and blueberry-topped cheesecake. Following a brief stop at the gift shop, your tour concludes with an approximately 30-minute drive back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves an extensive amount of off-road driving and a moderate amount of walking for approximately 200 yards (about 183 metres), at times over uneven, gravel, rocky, and natural surfaces, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach and UTV and embark/disembark the catamaran, three steps at the UTV site, and a gangway up to the George Inlet Lodge; steepness depends upon tidal conditions. The UTVs utilised on this tour seat two passengers, and the drivers switch halfway. The ride may be rough at times, and guests will experience bumpy, jerking motions. This tour is recommended for guests who are in good physical condition. This tour is not suitable for pregnant guests, guests with neck and/or back problems, guests with heart and/or respiratory conditions, guests with claustrophobia, guests prone to motion sickness, guests with limited mobility, and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Guests are advised to wear warm, comfortable clothing in layers that they won't mind getting dirty, including long pants and long-sleeve shirts with flat, sturdy, and closedtoe walking or hiking shoes, and bring sun protection, a weatherproof jacket, raingear, bottled water, and US Dollars or credit cards for purchases from the ship. The price of this tour is per person, based on two people sharing one UTV. Guests must be at least eight years old to ride as a passenger on this tour; minors must be accompanied by a parent or guardian over the age of 18. Guests must be at least 18 years old, and present a valid ID showing proof of age, to drive a UTV on this tour. Sixteen-year-old guests with a valid driver's license can drive, provided a parent/guardian is with them in the same UTV. A safety helmet and raincoat are provided; safety helmets must be worn the entire time during the UTV-ride. Guests weighing over 300 pounds (about 136 kilograms) cannot participate on this tour. The combined weight of both UTV passengers cannot exceed the limit of approximately 600 pounds (about 272 kilograms). Photography/videography is prohibited whilst driving the UTV. Guests must be at least 21 years old to be served alcoholic beverages. Although frequently encountered on this type of tour, wildlife sightings are not guaranteed. Operation of this tour is subject to weather conditions. A signed waiver is required to participate on this tour. Space on this tour is very limited; we suggest you book in advance to avoid disappointment. Alternative meal is available for guests that do not like crab. The lodge has 79 steps however a complimentary shuttle is available for those quests that do not want to take the stairs.

KTN-017 / Historic Cannery & Lumberjack Show

Explore some of the staples of Ketchikan's fishing and logging past during this immersive, half-day sightseeing excursion. Ketchikan, Great Alaskan Lumberjack Show, Competitive Logging Events

Depart the pier for the short walk to the Great Alaskan Lumberjack Show. Upon arrival, you are seated for an action-packed performance of this fun-filled and exciting, approximately one-hour show that celebrates a bygone era. Watch as southeast Alaska's rich logging history comes to life with thrilling displays of strength and agility. Clad in spiked boots and hard hats, these world champion athletes compete in 12 athletic events that are based on historic logging techniques and utilise seven-pound (about 3.2-kilogram) axes, six-foot (about 1.8-metre),razor-sharp saws, tree-climbing gaffs, and souped-up chainsaws. Downtown Ketchikan, George Inlet Cannery, Rainforest Trail-Walk, Salmon-Canning Buildings

Next, board your coach for a scenic sightseeing drive through downtown Ketchikan, past the Historic District and Creek Street, enroute to one of the oldest canneries in the city. The George Inlet Cannery is full of rich history from the original canning and fishing days. It operated from 1913 until 1958, when salmon was in abundance and high demand. Upon arrival, discover the little cove in which the George Inlet Cannery stands today, during a guided stroll along a nature trail. Explore the various buildings and exhibits showcasing the original salmon-canning equipment. After savouring the flavours of Ketchikan amidst pristine surrounds and breath-taking waterfalls, walk along the rainforest trail, return to your coach, and commence the approximately 30-minute drive back to the pier.

Moreover, its minimal ecological footprint, with no propellers disturbing marine life, makes it one of the most environmentally responsible choices. Whilst gliding gracefully on this narrated tour, hear captivating descriptions of the local wonders that await your discovery. Your colourful host delights the crowd with stories of lumberjack lore. Located a short walk from the pier, this celebration of a bygone era promises a rip-roaring good time and quality entertainment for all ages.

Enjoy the one-hour show from covered, heated, and cushioned grandstands, sheltered from inclement weather. Afterwards, you will have the opportunity to meet the athletes, take photographs with them and get autographs if desired. Remain in town to browse the sights and shops and return to the ship at your leisure.

Please note: A short walk of approximately 5 minutes is required from the pier to the venue. Should the ship be docked at Pier 4, transportation will be provided. The venue is wheelchair accessible, electric wheelchairs and scooters can be accommodated. This tour is recommended for all guests. Land Tour

The Totem Heritage Centre, home to the world's finest collection of 19th-century totem poles. Retrieved from abandoned Native village sites, these beautifully-preserved massive cedar monuments artfully record and retell the history and lore of Alaska's indigenous people. After a brief introduction by the museum staff, explore the museum and the wonderful artefacts. Potlatch Park

Enjoy a narrated scenic drive to Potlatch Park, where you will explore several centuries of Alaskan history. Start among their collection of antique cars - a 1932 Packard, 1924 Stanley Steamer and a 1937 Ford Pick-up, to name a few. Then get ready to take an awe-inspiring guided trip back to the 19th century as you explore a fully recreated Native Alaskan village, including 5 tribal homes and beautifully carved totems, one of which is an impressive 42 feet high. Take a moment to peer into one of the homes to see the diorama of how native Alaskans actually lived in the 1800's. Walk through a traditional style smoke house and carving centre to view where these creative works are made.

Alaska Totem Trading

Enjoy some free time at the Alaska Totem Trading for an opportunity to shop for authentic Alaskan art, crafts, totems as well as a large supply of souvenirs/curios to commemorate your visit. Don't miss viewing the small yet quaint museum attached to Alaska Totem Trading which includes an eclectic collection of rare vintage fire arms and other historic memorabilia before reboarding the coach for the return trip to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of walking of approximately 0.5 miles (800 metres) over gravel paths with some inclines for approximately 164 feet (50 metres), with 3 steps to climb in and out of the vehicle and it is not recommended for guests with limited mobility or those who utilise a wheelchair. Dress warmly in layers and wear comfortable footwear that can get wet, as this tour operates in all weather conditions. A minimum number of guests are required to operate. Upon arrival, receive your safety instructions and begin your guided sightseeing excursion through the pristine rainforest islands north of Ketchikan. Along the way, take in panoramic vistas of your surroundings, and look for whales, seals, eagles, sea lions, bears, seabirds, and other wildlife that inhabit this region.

During your picturesque excursion, a stop is made at an area beach or estuary for a hot beverage and a snack. On the return ride, hand over the helm to another boatman, and pass by rock islands where humpback whales and orcas frequently surface. When in season, ride deep into bays and inlets where salmon spawning streams attract black bears. At the conclusion of your journey, re-board the group transportation for the approximately 30-minute drive back to the pier.

Please note:Transportation on this tour is not private, only the Zodiac portion. This tour is sold per boat (zodiac) for up to 4 guests. Only one person in your party need reserve the tour and charges may be split between suites on board. This tour involves a minimal amount of walking, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach and embark/disembark the boat. If you love nature and the great outdoors, then do not miss this delightful outing at the private Alaska Rainforest Sanctuary. Depart the pier for the scenic, eight-mile (13-kilometre) coastal drive en route to the private Alaska Rainforest Sanctuary, an exclusive reserve located in the forested mountains at rustic Herring Cove.

Alaska Rain Forest Sanctuary

This pristine natural environment is home to bald eagles, black bears, seals, and a variety of birds and other species attracted by the major salmon runs (in season) in the abundant marine estuary. In addition to wildlife viewing, this tour provides a visit to a historic sawmill and interpretive center to observe a master Native totem pole carver at work.

Following the coastal drive and arrival at the private reserve, you are greeted by a naturalist before commencing your guided walking tour. The route proceeds along a trail walk, and through the heart of the dense forest past tall stands of hemlock, spruce, and Alaska cedar. Stops are made at strategically-located viewing areas. After arriving at a protected open estuary, follow Eagle Creek along an elevated, wooden boardwalk overlooking grassy wetlands. Major runs of salmon return here annually to spawn.

Watch and listen to the symphony of bird activity in this spectacular setting. During spawning season, the likelihood of viewing the area's fascinating wildlife is good. As bears and seals feed on salmon in Eagle Creek, bald eagles and other birds wait for scraps in the estuary. Seasonal ecosystem changes result in varying levels of wildlife activity.

A 0.75-mile trail walk will then bring you to the historic Herring Bay Lumber Company sawmill. Here, you can delve into the rich history of the area during a brief yet informative tour of this historic site. Visit the carving center to discover Native culture and traditions, and marvel at the impressive collection of Tsimshian totems on display.

Additionally, witness the craftsmanship of a local blacksmith as they practice their trade, providing a fascinating demonstration of traditional metalworking techniques. Before returning to the ship, explore the General Store for unique souvenirs and enjoy a refreshing beverage from our coffee shop or bar.

Please note: This tour involves walking on mostly flat, improved trails that are relatively smooth, with some inclines and no steps. It is suitable for guests who utilise a wheelchair providing they are accompanied by another guest able to push the chair up slight inclines on compressed gravel. Total walking distance is .75 miles (1.2 kilometres). Dress warmly in layers and wear comfortable shoes that can get wet as this tour operates in all weather conditions. Rain ponchos are provided. Discover a new way to enjoy Alaska's wildlife and rich coastlines by Sea-cycling. Your adventure on the ocean will allow you to savour the pristine fresh air while learning about Alaskan culture, history, and a working cove of today.

Ward Cove

Depart the pier for the short ride to the Mill at Ward Cove dock facility. Upon arrival, take a short walk to the dock area and float house base where you will gear up and review Seacycle water safety and functions. Your journey now begins by pedalling to a serene wildlife estuary where seals, ducks, eagles, jelly fish and starfish. Next, explore Ward Cove and pedal along the beautiful shoreline of the Tongass National Forest.

Cedar float house

Your journey ends back at the cedar float house where you will enjoy a hot beverage and snack and hear about some of the local traditions and community events families enjoy here in Ketchikan.

Your tour concludes back at the pier where you can re-join the ship or walk into the downtown area to continue exploring the area (time permitting).

Please note: This tour requires a moderate to extensive amount of activity with approximately 3 miles (5 Kilometres) of pedalling time on the water and approximately 50 feet (15 metres) of walking over sometimes uneven surfaces. Guests must be able to manoeuvre the floating dock ramp with varying inclines dependent on seas levels. This tour is not suitable for guests with limited mobility or those who utilise a wheelchair. Depart the pier via coach and enjoy a narrated tour of Ketchikan en route to Clover Pass Resort, the oldest continuously operated fishing resort in the State of Alaska. At Clover Pass, meet your boat crew before boarding a fully enclosed adventure boat. Your first stop will be an active eagle's nest. Then the Captain will navigate his way through bays and inlets as your narrator gives you insight into the local flora, fauna and sea life. Learn about the timber industry and how it shaped the development of Alaska, and get a feeling for life on the island.

Venture past the Back Island Naval Testing Facility, home to some of the most sensitive 'ears' on the planet. Get an insight about their work on cruise ships and Navy Vessels, including nuclear submarines. Keep your eyes open for wildlife as

porpoises and seals are frequent visitors along the tour route. During May and September whales are often sighted inside Clover Passage.

Your final stop is Silverking Lodge, located in the heart of Grant Island State Marine Park. At this working fishing lodge, you can check out the day's catch as fishermen make their way back from a day on the water. Walk the elevated boardwalk into the rainforest, get an up close and personal look at the flora and fauna of Southeast Alaska and take your picture next to the largest known red cedar in the Tongass National Forest.

Finish off your tour under a covered gazebo as you dine on a delectable seafood boil meal of crab, shrimp, clams, mussels, potatoes, onions, garlic, corn, and sausage, all cooked in one delicious pot and served piping hot on your table. And if you still have room, top off your meal with dessert. Before heading back to Clover Pass Resort, take a few minutes to take photos or soak up the atmosphere around the lodge where your coach awaits to take you back to the ship.

Please note: This tour involves a limited amount of walking/standing, mainly at the guest's discretion however it is not suitable for guests who utilize a wheelchair or scooter. In low tide the ramp is very steep. Guests must be able to make their own way on and off the coach and the boat. After receiving your safety and tour instructions, begin your unforgettable, educational, and interactive journey aboard the Aleutian Ballad with a scenic ride out to the calm waters of Annette Bay, home to the Tsimshian Native Americans. Along the way, your knowledgeable and experienced fishermen/guides, who have braved the wild Alaskan seas, share their personal, thrilling, and often heart-warming tales of survival, adventure, and fun.

Hauling in Crabs, Sea Stars, Octopi, Prawns & Halibut, Eagle-Viewing Encounters

There is over 50 times more life in the water than on land in Alaska, and this excursion offers a unique opportunity to enjoy the best of both. Watch with excitement whilst the fishermen pull up a variety of fishing gear from the ocean in their quest for sea stars, octopi, prawns, halibut, and, of course, crabs. Whatever is caught is shared with you and your fellow guests, and you are invited to touch and photograph these incredible, freshly-caught live creatures. Another highlight of your tour is the breathtaking, eagle-viewing encounter. Watch in awe as up to several dozen bald and other eagle species soar and dive within yards of the boat to grab fish off the water, one of many amazing photo opportunities to enjoy during your tour.

Breath-Taking Vistas & Photo Opportunities, Alaskan Wilderness, Wildlife-Viewing

This award-winning, must-see tour is amongst the most lauded excursions on cruise line and travel-related websites, and even more fun to experience first-hand. Be prepared with your cameras to capture incredible photos of the beautiful Alaskan wilderness, and some of the world's best wildlife-viewing. Your authentic adventure concludes back at the boat dock. Upon arrival, disembark the boat and commence the short walk back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a short walk along the pier and is able to accommodate all guests with limited mobility and guests who use a wheelchair or service animal. Guests are advised to wear warm, comfortable clothing in layers with flat, closed-toe walking shoes, and bring sun protection, a weatherproof sweater or jacket, bottled water, and US Dollars or credit cards for purchases from the ship. Guests must be at least 5 years old to participate on this tour; minors must be accompanied by a parent or guardian over 18 years old. KTN-P / Rainforest Canopy & Zipline Adventure

Glide through the top of a rainforest canopy along a series of cables suspended between tall hemlock, spruce, and cedars and gain a unique perspective on the rainforest surrounds. This adventure excursion combines a flight over 2400 feet (731 metres) of high tension cable, guaranteed to thrill all. Depart the pier for the brief transfer to Herring Cove, located within the borders of the magnificent Tongass National Forest. This major rainforest reserve embraces one of Alaska's richest salmon spawning streams and a pristine inter-tidal estuary. Abundant wildlife habitat here includes a high concentration of bald eagles, black bear, and a variety of other species.

Ziplines

At Herring Cove, an all-terrain custom 4x4 Unimog transports you up a steep rain forest hillside to the canopy chalet.

Professionally trained guides outfit you with state-of-the-art safety equipment and provide a detailed orientation before you mount the first platform. Your rainforest canopy challenge features a flight over nine ziplines, an aerial bridge suspended between tall spruce, hemlock and cedar trees, and ground-based nature trails.

Rainforest Canopy

Your guide will progressively ease you into the forest canopy along cables ranging from a short 100 feet up to 600 feet with platform as high as 100 feet above the ground. Eagles and bears are often seen from the platforms. Cross a hanging bridge that will lead you to our longest zip that breaks out into the canopy offering breathtaking views of the forest and salmon spawning creek below. Throughout this adventure, you will be surrounded by the sights and sounds of the rain forest wildlife preserve. The final zip-line emerges from the rain forest and transports you over lush grassy wetlands to a viewing tower overlooking the Whitman Lake Fish Hatchery, 55 feet above the ground where you will gently descend to the forest floor.

Time permitting, grab a freshly brewed coffee or a cold Alaskan beer and explore our Tsimshian totem park, see a master carver working, check out our historic sawmill and watch our local blacksmiths at work. Stop by the General Store to see photos taken during your zip-line experience and to shop for mementos of your Alaska adventure. Your excursion concludes with a scenic drive back to the ship.

Please note: This tour is recommended for guests in good physical condition who are at least 57" tall (144 cm) and weigh between 70 pounds (23 kilograms/3.6 stone) and maximum 250 pounds (113 kg/18 stone). Some walking and use of stairs is required. Take in splendid views of Ketchikan's picturesque and historical waterfront sites, and pass by the rugged coastline bordering Revillagigedo Channel. This area is a prime habitat for orca and humpback whales, Dall's porpoises and Steller sea lions.

Misty Fjords

Proceed into Behm Canal, which is surrounded by the pristine beauty of Misty Fjords. Your cruise then continues into Rudyerd Bay, an ice-carved masterpiece deep within the monument. Upon arrival, learn about the natural history of the fjords whilst gliding past 3,000-foot (914-metre) vertical cliffs. Feel the mist of glistening waterfalls and listen to the call of seabirds nesting

During the return voyage to Ketchikan, learn about Native culture and history presented by a Tlingit storyteller, watch a Native artist at work, or take in a tour-related video presentation. Your tour concludes at the pier.

Please note: This excursion is operated entirely on the vessel without stops. This tour may require guests to walk up to 300 yards (277 metres) to the boat loading area. It is suitable for guests with limited mobility and those who utilize a wheelchair; vessel is accessible to standard wheelchairs only (no electric scooters). Tour boat utilized is a 78-foot (24-metre), waterjet-powered catamaran including two decks of heated, inside seating, an expansive observation deck, galley and three restrooms (one is ADA accessible). Tatoosh Islands Boat-Ride

Your islands kayak adventure begins with a transfer to the Outdoor Adventure Centre, located at the north end of Ketchikan's only highway. Upon arrival, gear up for a scenic, fast and exhilarating, motorised, rigid inflatable boat ride to the Tatoosh Islands.

Tongass National Forest Kayaking

Upon arrival in this isolated and protected area, receive your safety briefing and kayaking instructions and equipment before embarking your two-person sea kayak and launching from the sheltered beach. During your guided ride, paddle around the Tatoosh Islands and experience the lush forest from up-close.

After your kayaking adventure, return to the beach and embark your rigid inflatable boat for the ride back to the Outdoor Adventure Centre. Upon arrival, relax with some refreshments and browse for souvenirs before transferring back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves an extensive amount of activity, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach, and embark/disembark the rigid-hulled inflatable boat and sea-kayak. This tour is not recommended for guests with back and/or neck problems, limited mobility and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Warm, layered clothing, flat, closed-toe walking shoes and sun protection are recommended. Raingear and dry bags are provided. Guests must not exceed 235 pounds (106 kilos / 16.70 stone) or be taller than 6 feet 6 inches (198 centimetres) in order to participate. Operation of this tour is subject to favourable weather conditions. A signed waiver is required to participate on this tour. KTN-U / Ketchikan Sportfishing

Test your sportfishing skills in the 'Salmon Capital of the World' during this half-day angling excursion in Ketchikan. Depart the pier and listen as your driver offers a glimpse at the past and present of the landscape around you. Your 20-minute drive takes

you out of the city of Ketchikan, along the Tongass Narrows, and towards Ward Cove that lies within the sheltered Clover Passage. Meet your Coast Guard-licensed captain, purchase the State required fishing licenses, and climb aboard your boat with its covered cabin, designed for 4-6 anglers.

These local waters jump with an abundance of salmon - the elusive King (Chinook) in May and June, the plentiful Pinks in June and July, and the fighting Silvers (Coho) salmon from mid-July through September. The preferred method of fishing is trolling by downrigger, with rods placed in holders and lowered to specific depths. Four rods will be used at one time and guests will be rotated between each pole. Once the fish have been hooked, take the rod on a rotating basis in order to land the fish.

During your three/three and half-hour hunt for salmon, your skipper provides refreshments, fishing tips, and stories about the ones that did not get away. Keep an eye out for the local mammals and birds such as seals, sea lions, and sea otter. Eagles are known to swoop down near the salmon boats, fishing for their own catch of the day and allowing you a stellar photo opportunity.

Catch and release your salmon, or if you wish, your catch can be processed locally and shipped to your home (within the continental USA) for an additional charge. Return to the marina where your transfer vehicle awaits to take you back to the ship.

Please note: This tour requires a minimal amount of walking; however, guests must be able to walk about 100 yards (91 metres) up and down a steep ramp at the marina and board the boat by stepping over the bull rail. This tour is not suitable for guests who utilize a wheelchair. A fishing license must be purchased for \$15 per person, plus an additional \$15 for the King Salmon stamp during king salmon season and these can be purchased online prior to the tour. The minimum participant age is 5 years. Children that are 15 years old and younger are not required to purchase sportfishing licenses and king salmon stamps. King salmon are catch and release per state requirements through June 14th,2023. To purchase your license prior to the tour, please visit the website at https://store.adfg.alaska.gov/ and select "Fishing, Hunting, Trapping Licenses & Stamps." In the "Short-Term Products for 2023" please select a 1-day sport fishing license at \$15, as well as a 1-day king salmon stamp at \$15 (only purchase during the months of May-mid July).

Guests must weigh less than 300 pounds (136 kilograms/21.4 stone). Dress in layers and wear deck or rubber-soled shoes; rain jackets, fishing gear, tackle and bait are provided. You may catch and release. Fish processing (vacuum packing and shipment) is available for an additional charge (credit cards are accepted). The catching of fish is not guaranteed. Catch cannot be brought to the ship.

KTN-W / Exclusive Flightseeing & 5-Star Resort

Ketchikan, Floatplane Flight-Seeing Tour, Southeast Alaska, Tongass Narrows, Mountain Ranges

Depart the pier for the short drive to the Taquan Air terminal, and your awaiting DeHavilland Beaver or Otter aircraft, the world's best, and most famous, bush plane. Upon arrival and after a comfort stop, receive your safety and flight instructions, then board your aircraft and begin your exhilarating, approximately 25 minute floatplane flight-seeing tour over Ketchikan and southeast Alaska. After lift-off, your floatplane gently glides over Ketchikan and the Tongass Narrows, bustling local communities, and awe-inspiring mountain ranges that define this remarkable corner of the world. Along the way, take spectacular panoramic vistas of the unrivalled beauty of southeast Alaska.

Alpine Lakes, Mountain Peaks, Tongass National Forest, Inside Passage, Wildlife, Clover Pass Inlet

This sprawling wilderness is adorned with remote indigenous communities, abandoned mining towns, high alpine lakes, breath-taking, snow-capped mountains, the lush, green Tongass National Forest, and beautiful blue waters of the Inside Passage. topped off with a delectable dessert. Following your meal and a stop to browse the gift shoppe, re-board your coach for the scenic drive back to the pier via Ketchikan's waterfront.

Please note: This tour involves a minimal amount of walking for approximately 50 yards (about 45 metres), at times over uneven surfaces and inclines, with a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach and three-four steps to board/de-board the floatplane; the steepness of the ramp to-and-from the floatplane dock varies with tidal movements. Walking at the Salmon Falls Resort is at the discretion of each quest. This tour is not suitable for pregnant quests, quests with a fear of heights, quests prone to airsickness, quests with a fear of heights, quests with limited mobility, and quests who utilise a wheelchair. ISP-E / Icy Strait Kayak Adventure

Admire Icy Strait Point and Port Frederick from the water as you paddle a two-person wilderness kayak along Hoonah waterfront and coastline.

Kayak Trip, Hoonah Waterfront and Coastline viewed from the sea

The 5-minute walk to the Kayak Center warms you up before the safety briefing and gear outfitting. Led by a safety-certified local guide and accompanied by a motorized boat, set off from the beach at Icy Strait Point into the protected waters of Port Frederick. Take in your guide's narration as you paddle your tandem wilderness kayak along the Hoonah waterfront, where bald eagles are often spotted and few humans can usually follow. Keep your eyes open and your spirit of adventure stoked along the way as humpback whales have been known to feed along the very same route. After an energetic 90 minutes, return to the beach and walk back to the pier.

Please note: Participants must be physically fit as this adventure includes walking 5000 feet (1500 meters) including over gravel and boardwalk, as well as sitting upright in a tandem kayak and paddling for 1.5 hours. A motorized safety boat accompanies the tour but guests should be able to paddle through small waves against a moderate current. A signed waiver is required to participate on this tour. Children aged 10 years and older may participate on condition that they meet the height and weight requirements. For safety and comfort using the kayaks, guests must be between 4'10" and 6'6" (1.47 - 1.98 meters) in height and weigh between 50 and 250 lbs (23 - 113 kilograms). Participants are advised to dress in layers and wear weather-appropriate clothing and comfortable shoes. Spray skirts, life jackets and paddles are provided.

"In Alaska's Wildest Kitchen" Demonstration, Interactive Workshop and Tasting

A 5-minute walk from the pier takes you to In Alaska's Wildest Kitchen for a demonstration and hands-on cooking and tasting session hosted by a characterful Alaskan fisherwoman and master wilderness chef. Experience wild, natural and sustainable Alaska seafood as only Alaskans can, while learning how local fishing, preservation and cooking techniques all set Alaska seafood apart. Watch an expert filleting demonstration and take the opportunity to grill your own sample catch-of-the-day over an alder-wood grill. All seafood is harvested by local fishermen in nearby waters, ensuring unbeatable freshness. The tasting menu includes fresh and locally canned salmon dishes and grilled halibut accompanied by a white wine spritzer. Take away complimentary printed recipe cards as a memento of this unique insight into local fare.

Please note: This tour is wheelchair accessible. Guests walk 2400 feet (750 meters) on the return journey to the culinary theatre but an electric care cart is available for those who have difficulty walking. Children aged 8 years and over may participate but guests under 21 are not allowed to drink alcoholic beverages. Participants are advised to dress in layers and wear weather-appropriate clothing and comfortable shoes.

ISP-G / Spasski River Valley Wildlife & Bear Search

Chichagof Island Forests and Muskegs, Alaskan fauna

Depart the pier for a drive into the wilds of Chichagof Island heading for the Spasski River valley in search of local wildlife. Listen to a local guide as your bus travels through the Tlingit village of Hoonah and out into coastal rainforest and muskegs. Watch for bald eagles, Sitka black-tailed deer and Alaska coastal brown bears, which can be seen anywhere along the road. Spasski River Valley

The Spasski River valley is famous for having one of the highest densities of coastal brown bears in the world. On arrival at the river valley, disembark the bus and follow your guide down a gravel path and boardwalks across a muskeg to viewing platforms strategically positioned over the lower Spasski River. Learn about the delicate rainforest ecology that supports the island's massive bears and all the other commonly found local flora and fauna. This area provides excellent birdwatching opportunities, and the Spasski River is an active salmon stream where bears are commonly spotted throughout the summer. Enjoy the rugged wilderness before re-boarding the coach for the drive back to the pier.

Please note:This tour involves walking (800 yards/730 meters) and standing for approximately an hour. There are a few steps to negotiate when boarding and leaving the coach, and the terrain includes boardwalk and gravel. Guests are required to be minimum 8 years old of age in order to participate in this tour. Participants should dress warmly in layers of weather-appropriate clothing and wear comfortable water-resistant shoes. On rainy days it is advisable to bring weatherproof raingear. Bring a camera and binoculars. Wheelchairs are not allowed on this tour. Wildlife sightings cannot be guaranteed.

ISP-H / Whale & Marine Mammals Cruise

Voyage to the renowned Point Adolphus area on a whale-watching vessel to spot humpback whales and many other marine mammals.

Cruise looking for Humpback whales, Orca (Killer Whales), Seal, Porpoise, Steller's sea lions

Depart directly from Icy Strait Point for a two-and-a-half-hour cruise on a safe, stable, covered, comfortable whale-watching vessel. Travel through the bountiful waters of Icy Strait to the renowned Point Adolphus area, home to Alaska's largest summer population of humpback whales. Along the way there is the possibility of spotting some of the region's other marine life including orca (killer whales), seal, porpoise and Steller's sea lions. Learn about the biology and behavior of the diverse species that gather every summer to include in Alaska's nutrient-rich waters. Enjoy the open-air observation deck, scan the area with binoculars and take advantage of the many and varied photo opportunities.

Please note: This tour involves minimal walking (50 feet/15 meters) as the whale watching vessel is boarded directly across from the cruise ship. The tour is ADA accessible: the vessel can accommodate mobility devices with minimum ground clearance of 3.5 inches (9 cm) and not exceeding 48 inches (122 cm) in length and 32 inches (81 cm) in width and with a combined weight not to exceed 600 lbs (272 kilograms). Children of all ages may participate. Guests should dress in layers and wear weather-appropriate clothing, including a waterproof jacket, and comfortable shoes. On sunny days sunscreen and a hat may be advisable, but guests should bear in mind that weather conditions may change suddenly. Bring a camera and binoculars.

ISP-I / Whale, Wildlife & Bear Search

Take advantage of Icy Strait Point's location for a day's adventure combining a whale watching cruise with a drive into the interior forests and muskegs of Chichagof Island to search for bald eagles, woodpeckers, Sitka black-tail deer and spot brown bears feeding on wild salmon.

Whale-Watching Cruise

Depart the dock for a high-speed two-and-a-half-hour cruise toward Point Adolphus and back. Whale sightings are guaranteed, and you will be traveling through waters that support a wide array of other marine life, including orca (killer whales), Steller sea lions, harbor seals, sea otters, porpoise and of course the magnificent humpback whales. Keep your eyes peeled for bald eagles in the evergreen treetops lining the shore. Learn from an on-board naturalist about the diversity of marine life that gathers here every summer to feed in the nutrient-rich waters, fueled by the long Alaska summer days. Cruise back to Icy Strait Point and take a short break before meeting the local guide who will accompany you on your wildlife search. Hoonah Tlingit village, Chichagof Island Forests, Spasski River

Board the coach for the 45-minute journey out to the Spasski River. This is a tour in itself as the bus travels through the Tlingit village of Hoonah and out through the interior forests and muskegs of Chichagof Island. On arrival at the river, follow your guide down a gravel path and across a boardwalk over the delicate muskeg to the viewing platforms by the river itself, and learn about the rainforest ecology that supports the island's massive bears. After an hour in this fascinating habitat, re-board the coach and return to Icy Strait Point.

Please note: This tour involves walking (800 yards/730 meters) and standing for approximately one hour. There are a few steps to negotiate, and the terrain includes boardwalk and gravel. Guests should dress in layers and wear weather-appropriate clothing and comfortable shoes. Children aged 8 or over may participate. Bear sightings cannot be guaranteed. About 450 meters/492 yards to the bus loading area. There is a ramp to get to the bus loading area and it could be steep, depending by the tides however, a golf cart service may be available. Wheelchairs are not allowed on this tour. The tour order may vary.

ISP-K / Scenic Mountain Ascent & World's Largest ZipRider

How does riding the world's largest ZipRider feel? Well, there is only one way to find out during your visit to the award-winning lcy Strait Point. Higher than the Empire State Building and towering at 1,330 feet (405 m) above sea level, our ZipRider boasts speeds of up to 60 mph and a 25% grade. Can you feel the adrenaline rush yet? At 5,495 feet (1,675m) long and 6 cables side by side, this is truly an experience of a lifetime.

Your fun starts with a mesmerizing ascent on the SkyGlider Gondola. You will find the views of Icy Strait, your ship, and maybe even a glimpse of the Glacier Bay National Park, breathtaking. A short gondola ride takes you to the top of the mountain and offer a short walk around to the launch platform. followed by an outfitting into your safety harness and brief safety instructions before the countdown begins. The gate opens, and you are accelerating, flying over the largest temperate rain forest in the world. The wind is whistling in your ears as you reach top speed during your descent - up to 60 miles per hour!

Back at sea level, a series of breaks will safely decelerate your ride at the Drop Zone in the heart of Icy Strait Point.

Please note: Participants in this tour must be physically fit enough to negotiate the ZipRider, including somewhat abrupt landings on the platforms. Guests must be able to lift their feet and hold tightly onto the zipline harness, therefore all photographic devices must have a lanyard or headgear in order to leave both hands free. The tour also involves walking 800 yards, mostly down a steep gravel trail from the mountaintop to the launch area. It is not suitable for expectant mothers, guests with back and/or neck problems, or those with fear of heights. To use the harness safely and comfortably guests must be between 4'4" and 6'8" (1.32 - 2.03 meters) in height and between 75 and 275 lbs (34 - 125 kilograms) in weight. Children may participate on condition that they fit within these height and weight limits. A signed waiver is required to

participate on this tour. Participants are advised to dress in layers and wear weather-appropriate clothing. Shoes must be closed-toe and should be comfortable. No guarantee can be made that guests will be able to descend the ZipRider in groups of their choosing. Guests under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

Please note that sometimes the Mountain Top Gondola may not be in operation. In such cases, the Ziprider will use traditional bus transportation to the Mountain Top. This will add 45 minutes to the tour duration.

SGY-006 / Yukon Suspension Bridge and Summit Tour

Difficulty

White Pass Summit

Bask in the stunning scenery of the White Pass Mountains and the surrounding area on this three hour tour, accompanied by a knowledgeable and friendly guide. Depart the pier, board the comfortable vehicle and climb 3,000 feet from sea level to the dramatic summit of the White Pass. This is a wonderland of impressive mountains, azure lakes and stunted forests. The pace is unhurried; you will have ample time to enjoy the view with stops at choice scenic locations.

Yukon Suspension Bridge, Canada

Once past the summit a stop will be made to visit the Yukon Suspension Bridge where you can venture out onto the bridge to get stunning views of the turbulent waters of the Tutshi River below. In addition to the dramatic scenery, a series of informative displays interprets the Klondike Gold Rush of 1898 and explains how this area was given the notorious moniker "the Dead Horse Trail." The tundra is protected here- you can walk along the boardwalk above the miniature world of alpine wildflowers and enjoy their subtle beauty without trampling them. After the visit, head back down from the Pass to sea level. You tour concludes with a short narrated drive through Skagway's historic district before returning to the ship

Please note: Since this excursion enters Canada, participants of all nationalities must bring their passport. This tour requires a moderate amount of walking for approximately 600 yards (549 metres) with some uneven ground at certain locations. This tour is not suitable for guests with limited mobility or those who utilize a wheelchair. Dress in layers with comfortable closed toed shoes, a waterproof jacket and a camera.

SGY-007 / White Pass Railway & Klondike Bicycle Tour

Experience the spectacular panoramic beauty of Alaska and British Columbia in an active new way during this scenic and invigorating, half-day excursion via train and bicycle.

Skagway, White Pass & Yukon Route, Mountains, British Columbia

Depart the pier for the short drive to the train depot, then board the historic White Pass & Yukon Route narrow-gauge railroad for a scenic, approximately 1.5-hour trip through the coastal mountains en route to Fraser, British Columbia, Canada.

Guided Bicycle-Ride, Klondike Highway-Summit of White Pass,

Upon arrival, meet your guides and board a coach for the ride along the scenic Klondike Highway to the summit of the White Pass. After receiving your safety and bicycle orientation, helmet and test ride, begin your guided, approximately 15-mile (about 24.1-kilometre) ride downhill on a winding mountain road from the summit to the sea. As you coast along the paved Klondike Highway, make multiple stops for photos of the historic White Pass & Yukon Route Railroad, cascading waterfalls, awe-inspiring glaciers, majestic mountains and peaks, and other historic sites.

U.S. Customs, Optional Shopping and Exploration in Skagway

During your bicycle tour, a stop is made at U.S. Customs to check back into the U.S. on bicycles. At the conclusion of your bicycle tour at the bicycle shop in downtown, you can re-board your van and commence the short drive back to the ship or remain in town for shopping and further exploration, and return to the ship on your own.

Please note: This tour involves an extensive amount of bicycling for approximately 15 miles (about 24.1 kilometres) and a moderate amount of walking for approximately 0.5 miles (about 0.8 kilometres), at times over uneven and gravel surfaces, hills and inclines, with a few steps to get on/off the coach and bicycle, and board/de-board the train. Walking in Skagway is at the discretion of each guest. This tour is recommended for active guests who are in good physical condition, and able to ride a bicycle for long distances. This tour is not recommended for pregnant guests, guests with neck and/or back problems, guests with heart and/or respiratory conditions, guests with a fear of heights, guests with arthritis in their hands (or other conditions that would inhibit operation of the brake levers), quests with limited mobility, and quests who utilise a wheelchair. Guests are advised to wear warm, comfortable sportswear in layers with flat, closed-toe sport shoes, and bring sun protection and a weatherproof jacket from the ship; high-heel shoes are not permitted. Guests must be at least 13 years old to participate on this tour; minors must be accompanied by a parent or quardian. Guests must be at least 4'6" (about 1.37 metres) in height to participate on this tour. Guests weighing over 270 pounds (about 122 kilograms) cannot participate on this tour. The bicycles utilized on this tour are mountain bikes with front suspensions, wide tires and hand-operated discbrakes (a.k.a hardtail mountain bikes). The cycling portion of this tour is mostly downhill, and requires extensive use of handbrakes to control speed. Some pedaling is also required, and quests should be comfortable mounting and dismounting bike regularly at stops. Safety helmets are provided, and must be worn the entire time whilst bicycling. Guests must carry their passports and ship's ID at all times. A signed waiver is required to participate on this tour. The tour sequence may vary. Operation of this tour is subject to weather conditions. Space on this tour is extremely limited; we suggest you book well in advance to avoid disappointment.

SGY-010 / Rainforest Bicycle Adventure

Cycle through a portion of the Klondike Gold Rush National Historic Park, all while experiencing the natural beauty and history of the Taiya River Valley, and explore the historic townsite of Dyea by bicycle.

Meet your guide on the pier and board the transfer van for the approximately 25-minute narrated drive out towards the former gold rush boomtown of Dyea. Once the staging area for the trek along the Chilkoot Trail and into the Yukon; Dyea was Skagway's rival city. Today, nature has reclaimed the land, leaving only ghosts of its Gold Rush past. On its place now stands a lush rainforest, which is home to an array of natural beauty. Your driver takes you along the coast of the inlet, to the beginning of the historic Chilkoot Trail.

After gearing-up and a safety briefing, follow your professional guide, versed in the ecology and history of the area, on a bike route, covering approximately five miles (eight kilometres). The terrain is relatively flat, allowing for easy pedaling.

Ride through the rainforest, visit historic ruins, the Chilkoot trailhead and the coastal tidal flats where eagles, salmon, colourful wildflowers, and dazzling mountains are often in view. Stop for a close-up look or photos of some of the sights along the way. This tour is ideal for those seeking mild exercise in the fresh Alaskan air.

After approximately an hour and a half, dismount your bike and re-board the transfer vehicle for the drive back to the pier.

Please note: This tour requires pedalling a bicycle with handbrakes for approximately 1.5 hours / 5 miles (8 kilometres) while negotiating rough sections of dirt road and trails on mostly flat terrain. It is recommended only for those guests who are physically fit and is not suitable for guests with limited mobility or those who utilise a wheelchair. Dress warmly in layers and wear closed-toe shoes; rain gear, mandatory helmets, and gloves are provided. Guests must sign a waiver to participate. SGY-016 / Sled Dogs & Musher's Camp

Immerse yourself in the fascinating world of dog-mushing during this interactive, half-day husky excursion. Skagway, Adventure Camp, Off-Road Mountain-Ride,

Depart the pier for the scenic and narrated, approximately 35-minute drive through downtown Skagway and along approximately nine miles (about 14.5 kilometres) of breath-taking coastline en route to Adventure Camp, a musher camp in Dyea. Upon arrival and after a comfort stop, board a Unimog, a 4X4 military vehicle, for an exhilarating ride up a private, rugged mountain road. Reach the dog sled area, which is located atop the mountain road.

Musher & Huskies, Sled-Ride, Tongass National Forest,

Your arrival is greeted by your musher and a team of several energetic Alaskan huskies, who take you on an exhilarating summer sled-ride down an approximately one-mile-long (about 1.6-kilometre-long) trail deep within the Tongass National Forest aboard a custom-built sled. Following your ride, re-board your Unimog for a ride back down the mountain. Along the way, a photo stop is made at a viewpoint overlooking the Dyea tidal flats.

Interactive Musher Presentation, Play with Puppies, Gift Shop

Upon arrival back at Adventure Camp, proceed for a 'Kennel Talk'. During this informative and interactive presentation, your musher shares fascinating information about dog sledding and answers any questions you may have. Afterward, some free time is made available to play with the adorable puppies, whose socialisation is essential to their racing success. You may also take a short, optional hike to a lovely waterfall overlook. Finally, some free time is made available to relax around a cosy fire, browse the unique gift shop at your own expense. Following your tour and a comfort stop, re-board your bus and commence the approximately 30-minute drive back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves a moderate amount of off-road driving and a minimal amount of walking for approximately 100 yards (about 91 metres), at times over uneven, gravel, muddy, snowy, and natural surfaces and inclines, with three steps to negotiate to get on/off the bus and five steps to get on/off the Unimog. Walking at the Adventure Camp is at the discretion of each guest. The ride may be rough at times, and guests will experience bumpy, jerking motions. This tour is recommended for guests who are in good physical condition. This tour is not suitable for pregnant guests, guests with neck and/or back problems, guests with heart and/or respiratory conditions, guests prone to motion sickness, guests with a fear of dogs, guests with limited mobility, and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Experience the scenic natural splendour of Alaska via rail, highway, and bridge during this panoramic sightseeing journey. Skagway, White Pass & Yukon Route Railway, Vintage Train Car-Ride, Waterfalls, Sheer Drop-Offs

Depart the pier for the short drive to the White Pass & Yukon Route Railway train depot. Upon arrival, step back in time whilst boarding a vintage train car for an incredibly scenic and narrated, approximately 1 hour 45 minute train ride. From your vintage train car, the sights of beautiful waterfalls and sheer drop-offs thrill you whilst your onboard narrator brings the history of Skagway and the summit to life. As you crest the White Pass Summit, a wonderland of giant mountains, azure lakes, and stunted forests, enter the eerie landscape of the Tormented Valley in Fraser, British Columbia. Upon arrival, de-board the White Pass train and board your coach for the drive to the Yukon Suspension Bridge.

Yukon Suspension Bridge Crossing, Rapids, Lunch

Upon arrival at the Yukon Suspension Bridge. Savour a hearty bowl of bison chili for lunch, then fall under the spell of the churning Tutshi River and its stunning mountain backdrop. Experience this country with all your senses; breathe in the pristine air, listen to the roar of the raging river, and thrill to the sensation of crossing a custom-built footbridge suspended approximately 57 feet (about 17.3 metres) above the rapids. Come away with an appreciation of the area's unique human and natural history through museum-quality interpretive exhibits.

Klondike Highway, Dead Horse Gulch, Railroad Route, Mountain Face, Klondike Goldfields

Leaving the bridge, re-board your coach and proceed for a ride along the Klondike Highway. From the highway, view Dead Horse Gulch and the railroad route etched into the mountain face where you travelled just an hour before. At the foot of the White Pass, your driver guide will shares stories of the Klondike Goldfields before returning to downtown Skagway. Your tour concludes back at the pier.

Please note: Guests are required to bring a valid passport. This tour involves a moderate amount of walking for approximately 630 yards (about 576 metres), at times over uneven and natural surfaces. Skagway, 'Thunderdome' Ocean-Rafting Staging Area

Depart the pier for the short walk to your awaiting bus, then commence the scenic drive to 'Thunderdome', the headquarters and staging area for your exhilarating ocean-rafting adventure. Upon arrival, meet your guides, receive your safety briefing, and don your safety gear, which includes a hat, gloves, goggles, and Coast Guard-approved 'Mustang' exposure suit to wear over your own clothing to keep you warm and dry throughout your journey. Afterward, embark your awaiting ocean raft.

Motorized Ocean-Rafting Adventure, Lynn Canal, Fjord, Steep Rock Walls

This is the same time of motorized boat utilised by U.S. Navy Seals and Coast Guard rescue teams. With its deep 'V' hull surrounded by inflatable tubes, your low-profile vessel is designed to deliver a smooth ride in any ocean condition. These motorized ocean rafts enable you to get closer to hidden beaches, intimate coves, and idyllic lagoons inaccessible via larger, heavier craft, and their small size enables maximum manoeuvrability to cover greater distances at speeds up to 50 m.p.h. (about 80 k.p.h.). Your thrilling ocean raft-ride takes you through the Lynn Canal, North America's longest and deepest fjord. Straddle the custom, shock-absorbing seats whilst racing by the steep rock walls of this spectacular fjord.

Shoreline, Coves, Waterfalls, Cliffs, Beaches, Wildlife, Photo Stops

Your vessel gets extra-close to the shore whilst exploring intimate, hidden coves, breath-taking waterfalls, towering cliffs, pristine beaches, and the area's abundant, endemic wildlife. Along the way, look for whales, eagles, seals, sea lions, mountain goats, seabirds, and more. Your knowledgeable captain makes multiple stops for photo opportunities and wildlife sightings, whilst providing a colourful narrative throughout the tour. On occasion, the captain turns off the engines, allowing you to soak in the sights, sounds, and smells of the rugged wilderness of this majestic fjord. Following your unforgettable ocean raft iourney, disembark your vessel, re-board your bus, and commence the short drive back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves an extensive amount of activity and a minimal amount of walking for approximately 66 yards (about 60 metres), at times over uneven, gravel, and slippery surfaces and inclines, with a few steps to negotiate to embark/disembark the motorised ocean raft. The ride may be rough at times, and guests will experience bumpy, jerking motions. This tour is recommended for active guests who are in good physical condition and can swim in water too deep to stand. This tour is not suitable for pregnant quests, quests with neck and/or back problems, quests with heart and/or respiratory conditions, guests prone to motion sickness, guests with claustrophobia, guests with balance issues, guests with limited mobility, and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Guests are advised to wear warm, comfortable, non-cotton clothing in layers with flat, closed-toe walking shoes you won't mind getting wet, and bring sun protection, a warm, weatherproof jacket, towel, plastic bag (for your cell phone camera, etc.), sunglasses with a strap, hat, gloves, a towel, bottled water, and US Dollars or credit cards for purchases from the ship; an extra layer of clothing and warm socks are recommended. Guests must be at least 10 years old to participate on this tour; minors must be accompanied by a parent or quardian over 18 years old. SGY-A / Eagle Preserve Float & Fjord Cruise

Experience the world-famous Chilkat Bald Eagle Preserve, home to nesting bald eagles and offering visitors the greatest likelihood of sighting wildlife in their natural habitat in Southeast Alaska. Travel to Haines on and embark on a river cruise that provides an up-close look at the flora and fauna surrounding the water's edge.

Skagway-Haines

Meet your guide as you disembark the ship and walk the short distance, about 125 yards (120 metres) to the Fast Ferry Terminal, where you board the vessel with your knowledgeable naturalist guide providing details of the history of the Lynn Canal and Haines. Keep an eye out for any marine life that may be seen along the way.

Chilkat Bald Eagle Preserve

The world-famous Chilkat Bald Eagle Preserve is 48,000 acres (19,425 hectare) of river bottom wilderness established to protect and perpetuate the world's largest concentration of bald eagles and their critical habitat. Virtually every portion of the preserve is used by eagles at some time during the year.

Upon arrival in Haines, board your touring bus for the 45-minute drive to the river 'put-in' location. After a brief orientation, receive any necessary outerwear, depending on the weather, and climb aboard an 18-foot (5.5 metres) inflatable raft for a peaceful rafting trip down-river, the best way to see the preserve.

River Rafting

Travel along the different channels of the Chilkat River during your 1.5-2-hour river float. Admire the scenery in the heart of the Preserve that includes towering mountains, cascading waterfalls, hanging glacial ice and unspoiled wilderness. Bring extra jackets to keep you warm and dry on your adventure.

At the conclusion of your riverboat adventure, disembark your raft at the landing area for a picnic style lunch and hot drinks on the riverside.

The touring bus then returns you to the fast ferry pier to board your vessel for the approximately 45 minutes ride back to Skagway.

Please note: This tour requires a minimal amount of walking for approximately 1000 feet (304 metres); however, guests must be able to embark/disembark the vehicles via steps and manoeuvre in and out of an inflatable raft with minimal assistance. Actual time on the river is approximately 2 hours. Raft is manoeuvred by guide with oars and does not require guests to paddle or row. This tour is not suitable for women who are past 20 weeks of pregnancy, guests with limited mobility or those who utilise a wheelchair. The minimum participant age is 7 years. Depart the pier aboard a streetcar for a sightseeing tour of Skagway.

City Tour

Your streetcar proceeds around the waterfront, along the boardwalks of the downtown area's Historic District and up to the Scenic Overlook for panoramic views of the town, ship, and surrounding peaks.

Gold Rush Cemetery

En route, your costumed conductor provides an engaging narrative about the harsh Skagway winters and small town life in Alaska. There will be a stop to explore the Gold Rush Cemetery and take photographs of the re-enacted Soapy Smith gunfight. Next, your streetcar passes through the residential neighborhoods of Skagway, the 'Garden City of Alaska', view historic homes, churches, city school and Alaska's most famous resident, the childhood home of Gov. Sarah Palin Your unique sightseeing tour via streetcar concludes back at the pier.

White Pass & Yukon Route

Climb aboard the legendary 'Scenic Railway of the World' for an exclusive on the rails adventure through Skagway's White Pass & Yukon Route. From the comfort of your vintage rail car, you can take in breathtaking panoramic vistas of mountains, gorges, waterfalls, and historic sites. Also included is a full commentary about the history of the Gold Rush and how this railroad became an International Historic Civil Engineering Landmark.

White Pass Summit

As the train reaches the White Pass you will receive a brass ornament of membership commemorating your ride abroad the White Pass & Yukon Route, a truly unique way to remember your trip to the top of the summit.

Please note: This tour requires a minimal amount of walking for approximately 300 feet (92 meters) with five steps to embark/disembark the train. A wheelchair-lift carriage may be arranged with advanced notice to ShoreConcierge@Silversea.com. Scooters cannot be accommodated. Silversea guests will have exclusive train cars, subject to a minimum number of participants. Guests will not get off the train at mile point 14.

SGY-M / Grizzly Falls Ziplining Expedition

Scenic Skagway, Coastal and Mountain Drive

Depart the pier for the approximately 35-minute sightseeing drive through historic downtown Skagway, then along nine miles (about 14 kilometres) of stunning coastline en route to Dyea. Upon arrival at the unimog base, board your customised all-wheel-drive unimog and proceed up the rugged mountain road, which offers stunning views of impressive rainforest and glacially-fed waterfalls.

Zip Line Tour

At the top of the mountain, your guides review your safety and tour instructions, and outfit you with state-of-the-art safety gear. Afterward, you are led to the take-off zone to clip in and begin your zip line experience. Soar through a course of 10 zip lines, the longest measuring 750 feet (228 metres), and stop by any of four suspension bridges for an opportunity to photograph your surroundings. In addition, pass directly above the glacially-fed waterfalls and feel their mist as you zoom by.

Mountain Drive

The zip line tour moves at speeds of up to 45 miles per hour (about 72 kilometres per hour); however, more cautious adventurers can always control their speed with a brake system. After completing the course, re-board your unimog for the ride back down to the bottom of the mountain then commence the approximately 40-minute transfer back to the pier.

Please note: This tour involves an extensive amount of activity, with approximately 0.5 miles (about 804 metres) of walking on natural, uneven ground, a few steps to negotiate to get on/off the coach and unimog, and 50 steps during the tour. This tour is recommended for guests in good physical condition, and is not suitable for pregnant guests, guests with limited mobility, guests with back and/or neck problems, and guests who utilise a wheelchair. Warm, layered clothing, sturdy, closed-toe walking shoes and sun protection are recommended. Depart the pier and enjoy a short interpretive drive through historic Skagway en-route for the White Pass Mountain. From the Klondike Highway, you'll hike for approximately 300 feet (91.5 metres) to the base of majestic rock cliffs. Here you will don rock climbing shoes, helmets and harnesses.

After a brief climbing introduction from the guides, your professional mountain guide will rope you up on one of multiple routes from which to choose from, some are easy and some are much more challenging, but all offer stunning views of the Skagway River, the White Pass & Yukon Route Railroad, and the surrounding wilderness.

Additionally, you can experience rappelling down the high cliffs. This adventure is perfect for those looking for a first climbing experience, but also for experienced climbers.

At the conclusion of the tour walk back down the trail to your awaiting vehicle for the return drive to Skagway. On arrival reboard the ship or walk to town to continue your adventures.

Please Note: This tour requires an extensive amount of activity/climbing and is not recommended for guests with limited mobility or those who utilise a wheelchair. Approximate climbing time is 2.5 Hours with 600 feet (183 metres) of hiking. Guests with pre-existing injuries may not participate in the climbing portion of the tour. Harnesses accommodate up to 52 inches (132 cm) waist and there is a maximum 300 pound (136 kilos) weight restriction. This tour is not recommended for guests under 6 years old. Ferry Ride to Haines

Your journey begins with a short 45-minute high-speed ferry ride along North America's longest and deepest fjord to Haines where you will enjoy spectacular glaciers and historic commentary as your guide points out marine wildlife - watch for whales! Kayaking

Upon arrival to Haines you will be greeted by your professional guide for the salt water kayak trip of a lifetime. The 2-person kayaks will be set up on the beach; a short 5-minute walk from the ferry pier at Portage Cove. Depending on the current

weather conditions and for the safety of the guests, an alternate kayaking location on Chilkoot Lake will be substituted. This is a fresh water kayak experience sheltered by mountains and remains quite calm.

Your guides will outfit you with a personal flotation device, spray skirt. A short but informative safety presentation and introduction to the kayaks will take place before setting off and paddling. You will be on the water for approximately 2-3 hours with the dramatic backdrop of the Chilkat Mountains. No previous experience is necessary and expert guides will make everyone quickly at ease.

Picnic Lunch

Next, return to the private beachside shelter for a waterside picnic lunch and some time to rest.

You tour concludes with a 45-minute ferry ride back to Skagway and re-board your awaiting cruise ship.

Please Note: This tour requires an extensive amount of activity and is only suggested for guests in good physical condition. It includes approximately 2-3 hours of paddling and is not suitable for guests with limited mobility or those who utilise a wheelchair. Paddle, Spray Skirt, Personal Flotation Device are provided. We recommend guests dress warm and in layers and bring extra pair of socks. Guests are welcome to bring binoculars and a camera on the kayak. Trek the path of those stampeders who ventured along the Chilkoot Trail in search of gold on this half-day hike and raft excursion down the Taiya River.

Board your private van at the pier and head through Skagway and drive out of town along the coast for approximately 30 minutes, to historic Dyea where your off-the-beaten-path excursion begins.

Chilkoot Trail Hike

The Chilkoot Trail, once a Tlingit trade route over the Coast Mountains, is a 33-mile (53-kilometre) trail through the Coast Mountains that leads from Dyea, Alaska, to Bennett, British Columbia. It was a major access route from the coast to Yukon goldfields in the late 1890s and today is the centre piece of the Gold Rush National Historical Park. During the Klondike Gold Rush, prospectors disembarked at the port in Dyea and used the Chilkoot Trail to head off in search of gold. Although Dyea is no longer the town it was, many animals such as brown and black bears feeding on salmon in July and August, and eagles are known to frequent this U.S. National Historic Landmark.

Begin your hike with two scenic miles (3.2 kilometres) of the Chilkoot Trail, now a tranquil place of incredible beauty. On this fast-paced hike, walk through a rain forest alive with birds and wild flowers as your guide explains the natural history of the trail, as well as the folklore and legends of the gold-rush era.

Taiya River Float Trip

Arriving at the shore of the Taiya River, board an 18-foot (5.5 metre) inflatable raft for the relaxing trip back to Dyea. As you float along this scenic river, through the temperate rainforest, keep an eye out for the variety of fauna and flora in the valley. Following the river voyage, come ashore to enjoy a light snack before the return drive to Skagway.
